### Today's Take-Aways

#### **COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution**

• Following extensive planning and collaboration both internally and with the Renfrew County and District Health Unit and other health care partners we launched our first COVID-19 vaccination clinic on Wednesday with the vaccination of 172 Marianhill staff and essential caregivers. By the time the current schedule of clinics is complete at the end of day on March 1st we will have provided nearly 1,100 doses of the Pfizer vaccine including approximately 300 to our own staff who are in the highest priority classification. In fact, with two available doses at the end of Wednesday's clinic we were able to vaccinate two of our staff – the first being Laura Behnke who is a Patient Services Attendant in the Emergency Department.

By the end of March, all health care workers are to be vaccinated which is why it's imperative that everyone who wants to receive a dose of the vaccine gets their consent form in now.

At this stage we don't know our clinic schedule for next week but vaccinate Patient Services we will be scheduling these once we have confirmed details on our Attendant Laura Behnke from next vaccine shipment. the Emergency Department -

#### **Regional Updates**

• New province-wide guidelines for screening school-age children

are impacting staffing. We are hoping to receive revised guidelines for our Health Unit however until that happens, everyone is expected to adhere to the new guidelines and stay home if someone in your household has one of the symptoms until that individual receives a swab that comes back negative.

• Renfrew County hospitals are implementing pre-op testing for all patients undergoing surgery under general anaesthesia. It should be noted that, despite this, it will not impact the surgical booking.

#### **Occupational Health and Safety**

• As of February 22nd , the provincial government changed the screening for all School and Child Care settings. A child will fail the screening with a single new or worsening symptom and they must stay home **without exemption** until:

- They receive a negative test
- They receive an alternative diagnosis by a health care professional
- It has been ten days since their symptoms started and they feel better

Along with this, any/all asymptomatic household contacts must also self-isolate "**without exception**, **even for essential reasons**." Currently this applies to all health care workers and you must follow the directive until the hospital receives an exemption.

If your child becomes symptomatic and you would like them tested, please call Occupational Health at extension 8200 to book an appointment.

## First COVID-19 Vaccine Doses Arrive At PRH

# **Everything you need to know about the COVID-19 vaccines**

#### Q: How safe are the new COVID-19 vaccines?

Only vaccines that Health Canada determines to be safe and effective are approved for use in Canada and available in Ontario.

After independent and thorough scientific reviews for safety, efficacy and quality, Health Canada has approved two vaccines for use in Canada: Pfizer-BioNTech (December 9, 2020) and Moderna (December 23, 2020).

This means the vaccines:

- were tested on a large number of people through extensive clinical trials
- have met all the requirements for approval, including safety

• will be monitored for any adverse reactions that may occur after vaccination and appropriate measures will be taken

Both vaccines which were manufactured in Belgium, require two doses for your body to develop adequate immunity. After two doses, they are expected to be 94-95% effective, which will lower how much of the virus can spread in the population, help build herd immunity and stop the pandemic.

#### Q: How were the COVID-19 vaccines developed so quickly?

Creating a new vaccine typically takes years. However, the progress on COVID-19 vaccines happened quickly for many reasons, including:

• being informed by decades of research on other strains of coronavirus prior to COVID-19, such as Middle East Respiratory Syndrome (MERS) and Sars-CoV (SARS)

advances in science and technology

• international collaboration among scientists, health professionals, researchers, industry and governments

· increased dedicated funding

#### Q: What has to happen before a vaccine can be distributed in Ontario?

Before any vaccines are available in Ontario, they:

• undergo rigorous clinical trials to ensure they are safe and effective

• are evaluated and authorized for use by Health Canada, using rigorous standards

#### Q: How will Ontario ensure vaccines remain safe?

Ontario's plan to make sure vaccines remain safe for Ontarians includes:

• securely and safely transporting and storing vaccines at required conditions and temperatures

• establishing safe clinic spaces to give people immunizations, including providing the required training to those administering vaccines

• monitoring for any adverse reactions or side effects that may occur after vaccination and taking appropriate measures, including working with the federal government and other provinces and territories

Health Canada will continue to monitor all authorized vaccines to ensure they continue to be safe and effective.
