#### Occupational Health and Safety / Infection Prevention and Control

- Following the recently announced changes to universal masking (as outlined in the May 3rd memo), we are going to be allowed to walk around more freely. However, if your travels take you outside of your area, think ahead. If there is a chance that you will run into a patient along your path, make sure you take a mask with you, and please remember that masking remains mandatory in all clinical areas, hallways, waiting rooms and elevators.

#### Rehabilitation



In recognition of Volunteer Appreciation Week, I would like to take a moment to pay tribute to the volunteers affiliated with our hospital and express my heartfelt gratitude to each for the contributions they have made to date.

The 2023 Volunteer Week theme is Volunteering Weaves Us Together. This reveals the importance of volunteering to the strength and vibrancy of our communities through the interconnected actions we take to support one another. These diverse forms of sharing our time, talent and energy strengthen the



fabric of our community, and in our case, strengthens our health care team.

As you will recall, the pandemic impacted many of our programs and services, and the work of our volunteers, in many areas of the hospital, was also put on pause. While our hospital-based Volunteer Program took a real hit and we continue to feel the loss of those individuals and the services they provided, most aspects of volunteering have resumed at PRH and for that, we are truly grateful.

In fact, we currently have nearly 200 volunteers who assist Pembroke Regional Hospital in various capacities including:

- 96 volunteers with the PRH Auxiliary who assist with BINGO, and provide key services through the Sunshine Gift Shop and Mural Café
- 15 volunteers who serve on our Board of Directors and sit as Community Representatives on Board Committees

Thank you to the Pharmacy Team who provided an excellent and informative Pharmacy Open House April 26th, so much exciting progress that is happening on the 5th floor!

Today I want to provide further updates on next steps in our transformation of the medication delivery system.

Having received Board approval for an investment of \$2.2 million for this project, we are pleased to announce that BD Pyxis has been selected as the preferred vendor for the purchase of Automated Medication Units for PRH. The vendor evaluations and valuable staff feedback have led to a strong belief that the BD Pyxis ADUs will help transform our medication delivery system to:

- Ensure that medications are readily available
- Improve medication safety
- And streamline medication inventory

Medication Transformation working groups have been established and those groups are now working through the planning process for configuring the ADUs and developing the IT interfaces, processes and education required to make the system work well.

As part of this, clinical unit visits are taking place to determine where the ADUs will be placed, what renovations will be required to ensure adequate working space, and how the flow of medication delivery will change. We want your feedback during these visits to assist in the planning process.

Other work taking place includes a review of bar coding technology to ensure that medication information can be captured for inventory and tracking purposes, and the Pharmacy team is looking at efficiencies in medication packaging.

Over the summer months, "Medication Transformation Super Users" will be recruited. This is your opportunity to be involved with this exciting project so stay tuned!

With all this work, we are currently on track for full implementation of the new ADUs and the new processes that will transform the way we deliver medications to our patients by next spring.

## Pembroke Regional Hospital - Joint Health & Safety Committee

#### Did you know?

In Canada, about 250,000 people (that is one in nine patients admitted to hospital), will pick up an infection while being treated for something else?

Also, every year, more than 8,000 patients will die from those infections!

## So what is the impact of Health Care associated infections?

Health care associated infections can cause:

- More serious illness
- · Prolonged hospital stays
- Increased wait times
- Long-term disability
- Increased mortality rates
- Increased cost of providing health care (up to three times greater than an uninfected patient!)
- High personal costs for the patient and their families

## What is the single most effective measure to help reduce health care associated infections? Hand hygiene

#### What are two methods of cleaning your hands?

- Alcohol Based Hand Rub this is the preferred method in all clinical situations when hands are NOT visibly soiled.
- Handwashing with soap and running water should be used when hands are visibly dirty or following visible exposure to bodily fluids. Handwashing should also be performed when caring for a patient with CDiff infection.

#### What are the 4 Moments of Hand Hygiene?

- Before initial patient/patient environment contact
- Before an aseptic procedure
- After body fluid exposure risk
- After patient/patient environment contact

#### How does the IPAC (Infection Prevention and Control) Team complete their monthly audits?

Each month, the IPAC team completes their audits by observing 200 hand hygiene moments throughout the hospital. A minimum of 20 observations are completed on each unit. "On the Spot" feedback is provided in a positive and discrete manner.

#### Where do the results of these monthly audits get distributed to?

Upon completion of the monthly audits, reports are posted on the Health & Safety boards found on the units. Results are also distributed to all unit managers, the Senior Leadership Team, the Joint Health and Safety Committee, the Board Quality and Patient Safety Committee, and the Organizational Quality and Patient Safety Committee.

On an annual basis, a report is submitted to HQO (Health Quality Ontario) and the annual rates are posted of the Pembroke Regional Hospital Website.



## Pembroke Regional Hospital - Joint Health & Safety Committee Did You Know...Continued

#### What is done with the information collected?

Data collected from the hand hygiene audits allow for further insights on the following:

- Corporate/Nursing Orientation
- Infrastructure concerns (eg placement of ABHR)
- Monitoring the conditions of equipment (ABHR, sinks, etc.) and determine if repairs are required
- Improvements on our eLearning module

### **Educational Open House Celebrates New Pharmacy Space**

A huge thank you to all who came out for the Pharmacy Open House this past Wednesday featuring the department's NEW Sterile Rooms!

Thanks to the Cancer Care Project, the Pharmacy department was able to build two state-of-the-art Clean Rooms (hazardous and non-hazardous), each with their own ante (small outer) room. The previous rooms had one shared ante room so space was limited. The previous rooms also had only one biological safety cabinet in the hazardous room and one laminar airflow workbench in the non-hazardous room – both required in the production of the sterile products. The new space has two in each room allowing for room to grow.

The Pharmacy team is proud to share that, as a result of the renovations, they are now one of the region's first hospital-based pharmacies to be completely compliant with the standards of the National Association of Pharmacy Regulatory Authorities (NAPRA) and the Ontario College of Pharmacists (OCP).

They would like to thank the CHEO Regional Shared Services Program for all their knowledge and input throughout their journey, as well as the hospital's Senior Leadership Team and the PRH Foundation for their support and investment in the Pharmacy department, which is part of the current Cancer Care Campaign of \$3.5 million. The team would also like to extend their gratitude to other members of the PRH team (maintenance, housekeeping, stores), to the Pharmacy staff for always stepping up, and to everyone else who had a role to play in bringing this phase of the project to completion.

Some important dates and numbers...PRH started providing closer-to-home chemotherapy treatments for cancer patients in 2011. In that first year, there were 338 patient visits for which 482 chemotherapy medications were prepared in our sterile rooms.

By 2021-2022, PRH had grown to 1,265 patient visits for which 2,156 chemotherapy medications were required!



The PRH Auxiliary's Sunshine Gift Shop hosted a successful Unleash Your Spring Fashionista Fashion Show April 28th at Our Lady of Lourdes Church Hall.
