Surgical Project

Last week, I had the opportunity to tour the inpatient Surgical unit and what I have seen is absolutely beautiful. As I have told many people

Kira's submission described her thoughts behind the name:

Horizon - The horizon represents the meeting point where the sky meets the ground, symbolizing the connection between our regional healthcare center and the surrounding rural communities that we support. The name Horizon captures this idea perfectly, serving as a bridge that integrates our Epic electronic health records system with the unique needs of our rural area. Horizon reflects our commitment to enhancing access to health records, empowering community members, and improving regional connectivity. This project embodies our goal to connect and unify healthcare services, ensuring that every individual has the support and information they need for better health.

Shortly before retiring, Dr. Pan shared with me that work was her life and she dedicated her life to this hospital and the patients of our region. Dr. Pan would attend every in service, grand rounds and educational event. She was truly a life-long learner.

I know many of you knew Dr. Pan well and have fond memories of your time spent with her. Her legacy and dedication as well as the legacy of Dr. Eng to health care will not be forgotten.

OTTAWA STROKE SUMMIT 2024



This event, attended by several staff members from PRH, featured insightful presentations, starting with opening remarks by Dr. Dylan Blacquiere and Dr. Debbie Timpson. One of the most impactful sessions was "Navigating the Emotional Rollercoaster: A Lived Experience Journey Through Stroke Care," presented by lan Whitecross, who received stroke rehabilitation at PRH, and his wife, Christine, who has been his caregiver throughout lan's stroke recovery journey. Their heartfelt account offered an emotional, firsthand perspective on stroke care, highlighting the importance of addressing mental health and supporting caregivers and families.

The session on "The Art of Client Teaching" by Ms. Theresa Straathof was particularly helpful, providing practical guidance on how to apply the Adult Learning Model to better educate patients who have experienced a stroke or TIA. Engaging debates at the end of the event further stimulated thought and conversation. There were many practical takeaways, and we are hopeful that the knowledge gained will drive positive changes within our organization.



With the growing number of patients surviving stroke plus the increasing number of strokes projected among the aging population the demand for stroke services is on the rise. Opportunities exist to better support stroke awareness, prevention, care, treatment and recovery. The Ottawa Stroke Summit is an engaging day-long educational event organized by the Champlain Regional Stroke Network and partners and accredited by the University of Ottawa's Department of Continuing Professional Development.

Spotlight on Ambulatory Clinics

The Ambulatory Clinics play a significant role in our community's health, yet not everyone knows what services are available in our PRH clinics and the work that happens here.

Did you know that every day, our nurses, physicians, dietitians, and respiratory therapists have encounters with over 125 patients or clients, with over 28,000 encounters each year?

Our clerks schedule, greet and register dozens of patients daily in our systemic, general clinic and fracture clinic areas.

Multifunction Rooms

In our multifunction room on the ground floor of Tower D, our nurses assist local and visiting physicians and specialists who provide procedures and treatments. These services range from gynaecology to wound care, plastic surgery to ophthalmology. Many patients have been waiting a long time for these minor procedures, so they are happy to have this service available closer to home, in their own community.

Our newly renovated multifunction room located on the third floor of Tower A within the Surgical Day Care area, is now home to our urology clinics and planning is underway to expand the use of this clinic space to other specialties.

Orthopedic Fracture Clinic

The fracture clinic led by our orthopaedic surgeons, Drs. Chang, Dejesus, Holder, and Mathew sees approximately 400 patients each month. This program is supported by our specialty trained clinic nurses who place and remove casts, splints and help assess patients with fractures pre and post-surgery.

Procedure Room

In the procedure room, our nurses apply ambulatory blood pressure and Holter monitors, remove sutures, staples and catheters and assist family physicians with minor procedures.

Stress Lab

Our stress lab uses state -of-the-art technology to perform treadmill stress tests in the Diagnostic Imaging Department. With the guidance of an internal medicine physician, our nurses prepare and

support the patient and physician as the test is performed.

Telemedicine Program

Our telemedicine team helps bring specialized care closer to home. Physicians from across Canada can dial in to our big screens to see their patients. Specialized equipment allows our telemedicine nurses to be the eyes and ears of the physician.

Medical Day Care

Our systemic therapy and medical daycare clinic provide necessary cancer care treatments closer to home, as well as blood transfusions, intravenous iron transfusions, IVIG and community paracentesis.

Vascular Health

Our diabetes education, heart function and stroke prevention clinics offer chronic disease management with our trained nurses dieticians and educators. By phone, in person or in one of our group settings, our team works hard to give quality care to those living with a vascular health Colleen Gribbon (Diabetes Education), condition.

We also host a myriad of other important clinics, including respirology, pain management, plastic surgery, geriatric Sandra Mask (Telemedicine) on screen. assessment, nephrology, ophthalmology, amputation clinic, a satellite dialysis clinic (staffed by RVH) and an EORLA community lab.

CONSTRUCTION CORNER

Tower A:

- Cancer Care Project: Further commissioning is scheduled for October 23rd and 24th.
- Surgical Day Care Project: Both south and west wings are getting deficiencies resolved including final touch ups before the October 28th handoff to the Hospital. The Olympus boom was raised in the Ophthalmology Suite. Telemetry antennas will be installed before the end of the month.
- The terrazzo floor was repaired in A209 and the room was painted. The flooring was also replaced in A421 and the room was painted. The former Strategy Room A140 in AMH and the OR On Call Staff Kitchen/Lounge A421 were both painted.
- The HVAC cooling ducts were extended from A501 Pharmacy into adjoining A502, A503 and A504 and from the Chapel into the Spiritual Care Coordinator's office.

Tower C:

- Main Entrance Project: The drywall was installed inside the new Mulvihill Drug Mart location. The HVAC duct work was completed on the roof and the air handling unit was delivered and installed on the concrete pad behind the Dialysis Unit. The heating lines were tied into the C142.1 Kitchenette for the radiant ceiling panel. Phase 2 completion is now scheduled for November 27th.
- The purchase order was issued for the electrical work for the installation of a new Reverse Osmosis (RO) in the Dialysis Unit.

Tower D:

 Medical Day Care Project: Work is ongoing on the second phase where some plumbing and electrical were tied into the rest of the building. Phase 2 completion is now scheduled for December 16th.
