### **RVH Report Released**

I wanted to take a moment to share an important update regarding our colleagues at Renfrew Victoria Hospital, following the June 5th release of the final report from their provincially appointed supervisor.

As you may recall, in June 2024, a supervisor was brought in to address serious concerns about financial practices at RVH, particularly those involving a related entity called Renfrew Health (RH). What began as questions about fund transfers, quickly uncovered a broader pattern of irregularities tied to former leadership - most notably, practices in regards to executive compensation and personal expenses.

Despite these challenges, the report highlights the strength and dedication of RVH's current staff and physicians.

The hospital has maintained high standards of care throughout, and the new leadership team has been instrumental in driving a turnaround. Key steps have already been taken: RH is being dissolved, funds have been repatriated, a new CEO, Suzanne Madore, has been appointed, and governance structures have been overhauled to ensure transparency and accountability moving forward.

This situation serves as a powerful reminder of the importance of strong governance, transparency, and the courage to ask difficult questions. It also reinforces the resilience of healthcare teams in the face of adversity.

As health care professionals, let's continue to support one another, stay informed, and uphold a culture of transparency and excellence in everything we do.

As we journey towards Epic implementation, you will begin to see regular and increasing communications about the work that is being done and how it may impact your role at PRH.

Imprivata single sign-on will be gradually installed department by department over the next 6 months.



Most of our clinical staff are already familiar with Imprivata. It's currently used on all med carts and dictation workstations. Going forward, these "tap' sign in pads will be at all staff workstations.

This means that when a user "taps in", the computer itself will log in as the user instead of a generic user. This is a more secure system and as a result, there is less risk of users having their account open on a workstation for others to use. This also allows staff to secure a workstation by "tapping" out.

As we prepare for the arrival of *Epic,* we will be adding tap access to all clinical computers!

### The benefits?

Single Sign-On (SSO): Allows users to access multiple applications with one set of credentials, enhancing security and efficiency.

Multi-Factor Authentication: Ensures that users verify their identity through additional methods beyond just a password.

Secure Access to Applications: Provides fast and secure access to shared devices and applications, improving productivity and reducing cyber risks.

Also, by logging into the desktop as the user, they will have access to SharePoint and their email without having to log in again.

### Coming soon to your department... Epic huddles!

In order to ensure everyone is kept informed about *Epic*-related work while also ensuring that regular huddle work and improvements can continue, all departments will be launching *Epic*-specific huddles in the coming weeks.

### **Communication Template Developed For Working Groups**

As you can imagine, there is a lot of information being shared at the Working Group level, even this early in the Epic implementation journey.

In order to have a standardized way of capturing key messages and determining how these should be shared and with which audiences, a communications template has been created.

We will be working on ensuring that all information is shared appropriately and in a timely, consistent manner and this is just one of the ways that we will be doing this.

### Tower A:

• Cancer Care Project: We are working through humidity issues with Engineering Air.

• Surgical Day Care Project: Work is progressing well on the 1st floor and the rooms are expected to be completed by the middle of July. The drywall, ceiling grid, tiles and doors were all installed and the rooms have been painted. The electricians are installing the lighting fixtures and the receptacles.

• Sanitary drain pipes were replaced in the A130 Physician Charting Room and in the ICU Staff Locker Room. A130 was also painted.

### Tower B:

• The Mamo office, locker room and waiting room were painted.

• A wider door was installed in the Echo room.

### Tower C:

• *Main Entrance Project:* Mulvihill Drug Mart moved into their bright new space on Friday, June 6th. On the same day, the SP+ parking office also moved from C004 to their new location in C018 next to the elevator. The next phase of the renovations will be starting on June 16 and will involve work on the entrance door and in the former drug mart space which will house the Auxiliary's Gift Shop.

• All the new equipment was installed in the Dialysis Unit's new Reverse Osmosis (a type of water filtration system) room. The electrical and communication wiring were completed. The Ship ladder (ladder at an acute angle steeper than stairs) for access to the Mezzanine floor had to be removed and an alternate access will be from a new door to be installed in the back of the C142 Boardroom. The equipment supplier will be on site on June 23rd to start the commissioning process which is expected to take 3-4 weeks before the old equipment can be removed from service.

### Tower D:

• *Medical Day Care Project:* The baseboards were installed and we are waiting on a few doors and hardware. The glass was replaced in the waiting room wall. We are working though ceiling air diffuser noise issues within the main clinical space.
